Global Refuge Needs Us!

Why did the UIF Council vote to contribute \$5,000 to Global Refuge at their February meeting? A bit of history and current situation of the agency should explain why.

One of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America's sister agencies is Global Refuge, formerly known as Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service. The founding during World War II was in response to the many displaced people due to the war Europe. Since then, the need to provide refuge and asylum to people due to war, conflict and persecution has continued for people all over the world.

Over time Global Refuge has become a trusted partner of the federal government to provide needed services to asylum seekers, awarding contracts to the agency. The agency was one of a few given responsibility for resettling unaccompanied minors, i.e. *children* with no adult relatives.

But all that work stopped due to executive order and the cancellation of contracts. Leaving thousands of refugees already being assisted by Global Refuge in the lurch. Those people were working within legal immigration policies and are already in the U.S. or waiting in third countries for help. Among those waiting to come to the U.S. are Afghan translators and helpers who were promised resettlement by our government.

ELCA members and congregations have supported this agency, and our advocacy and donations are needed more than ever. Spreading the word about helping the agency is as important as monetary contributions. \$90K for 90 Days Ministry partner of the Metropolitan Chicago Synod ELCA, RefugeeOne is Chicago's largest refugee resettlement agency.

As of January 27, the Trump Administration suspended new refugee arrivals indefinitely and cut off the usual first 90-days federal funding aid for refugees who were already here.

RefugeeOne offers holistic support for newcomers for up to 5 years—making sure to see them through to becoming self-sufficient community members.

They welcomed more than 500 refugees in the 6 months prior to the federal suspension, and despite the cut off of government funding they are committed to walking alongside these newcomers without disruption of services.

Our support is needed to help with out-of-pocket costs for the newest arrivals who are still getting on their feet.

Combined efforts from ELCA partners could make such an impact: \$90,000 raised will support at least 60 refugee families with \$1,500 rent and food subsidies that will offer immediate relief. Covering these costs will help RefugeeOne stay the course to continue serving newcomers long-term—through English classes, job coaching, mental health care, youth services, and more.

Thank you for coming together as a synod in the call to love and care for our neighbor, to live out being one body, and exemplify how we are better together!

United in Faith NEWLY ADOPTED Welcome Statement

At the February 2025 Annual Meeting, United in Faith adopted a new welcome statement. It is as follows:

United in Faith, as a community of united disciples striving to be God's hands, feet and voice in the world: affirms its intention to openly welcome and value every person who walks through our doors regardless of race, nationality and ethnic origin, age, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity and gender expression, marital status, social and economic situation, abilities, cultural realities and needs; supports efforts to share with all, God's gifts of love, acceptance and grace; commits to racial equity and antiracism; invites all people, uniquely created by God, to experience the word of God, communion and the promise of the risen Christ; and, encourages all people to participate fully in the ministries of this congregation, which are based on its purpose and guiding principles.

What Can I Do?

It can be easy to feel swept into chaos and feel like you don't know what to do or who to support in the world today. The thing is there are many people and organizations that are making real difference in peoples lives. Below are some local places to learn more about, volunteer or send cash donations. There is something you can do! Check them out.

Hope for the Day (and Sip of Hope)

Hope for the Day is a non-profit organization empowering the conversation on pro-active suicide prevention and mental health education. Through outreach, mental health education and community action, Hope for the Day seeks to prevent suicide by eliminating the stigma and silence around suicide. One example of their local outreach is the Sip of Hope Café with locations in Logan Square and Hyde Park. The coffee served at Sip of Hope is the world's first coffee where 100% of the proceeds go towards proactive suicide prevention and mental health education. The cafes also provide a safe gathering place where it is "Ok not to be OK". More information can be found at https://www.sipofhope.com/

Resurrection Project Immigrant Justice Program

The Resurrection Project Immigrant Justice Program, a program within the Resurrection Project organization, seeks to build an equitable future for immigrant communities where immigrants can celebrate their full humanity. In collaboration with many community organizations, legal experts and advocates, the Immigrant Justice Program endeavors to provide every immigrant with access to trusted guidance and a voice in shaping a just future. Particularly in these last few months, the Immigrant Justice Program has been a vital resource in educating immigrant communities about their rights and connecting them with legal services. Maryville Crisis Nursery

Maryville Crisis Nursery, located at 6650 W. Irving Park Road, is within walking distance of United in Faith. The Crisis Nursery provides free, short-term care for parents in distress and experiencing a crisis. Children from the age of birth to six years old can receive round-the-clock childcare for up to 72 hours for each stay. Issues that may bring a family to the Crisis Nursery include, unemployment, parental illness or hospitalization, poverty, or homelessness. The Crisis Nursery also has a 24-hour Crisis Helpline, crisis counseling, referrals to supportive services and Parent Support Programs. More information can be found at https://maryvilleacademy.org/

Onward Neighborhood House

Onward Community House is located at 5413 West Diversey Avenue. They are oriented to primarily help new immigrants access resources and find a community of support. They provide early childcare and after school programs so parents can trust their children are safe as they work knowing their children are safe. Their Community Computer Resource Center provide basic access and technology class for homework and career support. Other services: ESL, citizenship, a food pantry, and assistance accessing other resources, such as mental health programs, when needed. More information can be found at https://onwardhouse.org/

LYDIA Home Association is located at 4300 West Irving Park Road, east of United in Faith. They are a Christian, nonprofit organization that has been serving children in Chicago since 1916. Their mission is to strengthen families to care for children and to care for children when families cannot.
