2024 METROPOLITAN CHICAGO SYNOD ASSEMBLY REPORT

In Jesus' Name. Proclaim the Gospel. Make Disciples. Do Justice

This year's assembly focused on the last portion of the Synod's mission statement: Do Justice. The featured speaker, Tonika Lewis Johnson, delivered a keynote titled *The Art of Change: Disrupting Urban Inequity and Segregation with Art,* drawing on her renowned work in photography and community engagement in Chicago. Her address resonated deeply with attendees, highlighting pressing issues within urban land-scapes. She also spotlighted the Folded Map Project, underscoring efforts to bridge geographic and racial divides within Chicago through innovative community initiatives.

The assembly included breakout sessions that catered to diverse interests and concerns. George participated in an Al-focused discussion, exploring the implications of artificial intelligence, while Pam engaged in the Civic Life and Faith session which reviewed the draft social statement which discusses the role of religious communities in civic responsibilities. Pastor Jeanne attended the Social Trends session, examining current social issues and their impact on communities and churches.

Resolutions were presented regarding:

>reinvestment in the Synod - using financial resources to work towards our siblings and our congregations having equal access - to address issues noted in the keynote address

>the Palestinian/Israeli conflict

>affirming the Synod's Reconciling in Christ status

A memorial was presented For an End to the Occupation, Restoration in Gaza, and Justice for Palestinians and Israelis.

Minor amendments were made to the Synod constitution.

A budget was presented and approved.

Elections were held for delegates to the 2025 Churchwide Assembly and positions on the Metro Chicago Synod Council and the Committee on Discipline. The attendees experienced a transition to an electronic voting system, marking a significant change in how decisions were made. While this move aimed to streamline processes and enhance efficiency, there were a couple of glitches reported during the assembly.

Overall, the assembly served as a platform for insightful discussions and strategies to address societal challenges, featuring a range of perspectives from prominent speakers and interactive sessions tailored to attendees' interests and concerns. Additionally, it served as a platform to reconnect with former acquaintances, including Dale Tippett Jr, our former band member, who served as the Assembly music leader.

Government is intended to serve God's purposes by limiting or countering narrow economic interests and promoting the common good. ... Governing leaders are to be held accountable to God's purposes: "May [they] judge your people with righteousness, and your poor with justice. ... May [they] defend the cause of the poor of the people" (Psalm 72:2).

Are you like many who are pessimistic about our democracy and its survival? About the state of the nation with polarization and corruption and lacking confidence about keeping the government functioning? Do you ask what has Congress done for us recently? Perhaps you are in the majority that feels exhausted and angry. A partner-ship among WBEZ, the Chicago Sun Times and the University of Chicago's Center for Effective Government, along with support from the Pulitzer Center developed The Democracy Solutions Project. The intent is to inform Chicago area residents not just about the votes they will cast but about the institutions of democracy itself with a hard look at what's working and what isn't. The goal is for us to understand how we fit into the broader context of our democracy and help us to make choices at the ballot box and in our everyday life. Prepare yourself for your journey to the ballot box in November by reading the solutions-oriented reporting and analysis at wbez.org/democracy.
